3Principles of Proper IDT Documentation

Hospice Documentation Risk Areas •Sufficient evidence of hospice eligibility •Admission •Ongoing •Hospice physician documentation of unrelatedness •Meds, diagnoses, etc... •Insufficient evidence of meeting Medicare Conditions of Coverage •Sufficient evidence for GIP and CHC days of care

Determining relatedness in hospice care

After many emails from hospice chaplains around the country asking for an IDT note template, here is one. While some hospice agencies do not take this part of hospice chaplain documentation seriously, IDT notes are critical for a hospice company's survival and compliance.

Hospice Chaplain IDT Notes - HOSPICE CHAPLAINCY

• A hospice is required to make certain that the physician's clinical judgment can be supported by clinical information and other documentation that provide a basis for the certification of 6 months or less if the illness runs its normal course

Hospice Documentation for the IDT The Big Picture

The delivery of hospice care is based on the comprehensive assessment and the individualized plan of care, both of which require the involvement of the IDT. The comprehensive assessment is intended to assess the patient and family from a holistic point of view, not just from a medical perspective.

The Role of the IDT in Meeting Hospice Regulatory Requirements

Eligibility documentation is the primary area requiring significant improvement in most hospice programs. It is also the most at-risk area for payment by CMS. This article will focus on helping clinical hospice staff- especially chaplains to understand their role and learn ways to improve this process.

Five Steps to proper Hospice Chaplain Documentation- For ...

• The hospice has an established method to relay documentation of actions taken after regular business hours (e.g. protected/encrypted emails and texts, faxes, documentation in the patient (electronic) medical record). On-call logs are used to document the response to all contacts and requests made after regular business hours.

Standards of Practice for HoSPice Programs

•Not all documentation is an "assessment" •Do you have places to summarize events and findings? -IDT notes -Recert summary forms-not just check boxes! 32 Strong Narratives •Require clinical skills -IDG members •Accurate and complete clinical documentation -Physicians •Prognostic awareness and analysis

Hospice social work: honest, practical, comprehensive ...

Templates and checklists are going to be a part of your life, because they are how hospice agencies ensure some uniformity and completion in documentation. But they can be misleading, because just because you filled out the form according to the form's specifications doesn't mean your documentation is complete.

Hospice social work visit notes made easy

a hospice agency or documentation vendor may request as part of their internal policy that two physician signatures are obtained at the start of care for each benefit period. This is not a Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) mandate, it is an internal policy.

Interdisciplinary Team Competency Grid

Hospice Criteria for Cardiac Heart Failure (CHF) | Compassus

Hospice standards ensure a comprehensive assessment of patient and their family with 48 hours of electing service. The IDT then coordinates services through regular face-to-face interaction/evaluation with the patient and their family no less than every 15 days.
