6. Teach them how to play by themselves. Along with teaching your children how to play with you; you should also teach them how to play by themselves. This task can be a little daunting, but it doesn't have to be. Since you should already be playing with your child, you just have to take this one

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step further. It is called “ fading proximity ” .

Strategies for Teaching Appropriate Play Skills in Children

Similar to step 1 (above), we would teach the child to tolerate playing near peers, also called parallel play. Parallel play remains age-

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appropriate until about age four when interactive play typically emerges. Tip: Kids love trains? Build one track and have them each drive their own cars around the track.

Teach Through Play — Encourage Play

Play may consist of amusing, pretend or imaginary, constructive, interpersonal (play with others) or intrapersonal (solitary play) interactions. Play is the way that children learn about the environment, their bodies

Children with autism must be specifically taught to engage in social and play activities, and often require direct instruction to learn to play with others. Instruction in play skills is noted in the literature as important for young children with autism, yet little evidence suggests which of several teaching

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methods is most effective.

Learning occurs in the context of play for young children. Previous research has shown that many young children lack developmentally appropriate play skills. Play

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interventions have been developed to assist those children who may be lacking play skills. However, there is little research on direct play skill interventions for children who exhibit challenging behaviors. This study examined the effects of a four-week play skill intervention for six children with behavioral needs who attend a mental health

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With Autism day-treatment facility. Three children were in the play skill intervention group and three children in the comparison group. The intervention occurred twice a week for four weeks and followed a “ Plan, Play, and Review ” method. All three children in the intervention group increased in the amount of time spent in pretend play and the highest

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level of play achieved
