Hurt people hurt people. Say there was a novel in which Holden Caulfield was an alcoholic and Lolita was a photographer's assistant and, somehow, they met in Bright Lights, Big City. He's blinded by love. She by ambition. Diary of an Oxygen Thief is an honest, hilarious, and heartrending novel, but above all, a very realistic account of what we do to each other and what we allow to have done to us.

Based on the best-selling novel by Jeffrey Eugenides, *The Virgin Suicides* is director Sofia Coppola's evocative debut feature of young love, sex, loss and family pressures in mid-1970s America.
